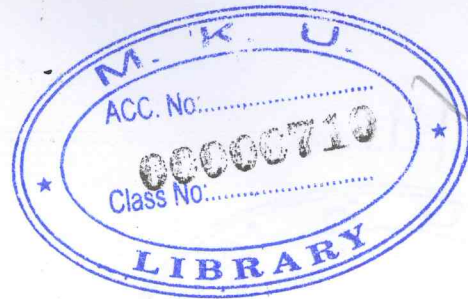

## ABSTRACT
